Welcome to Term 3 and a special warm welcome to the new families who have joined our College this term. By this time of the year all our girls should be focussed on their learning and particularly at senior level NCEA assessments. All Year 11-13 students will have assessments that are important for their final NCEA success. Your daughter can show you her NCEA strategic planner and explain exactly what she needs to do to achieve success.

The current NCEA debate is important for parents of our junior students to follow, as it is they who will be impacted as changes are implemented from 2020. It is also a significant issue for all of you who may employ young people in the future. Any changes to NCEA are going to affect Gen Z and these are your children. NCEA was introduced between 2002 and 2004 and many of you will remember that it took some time to be considered a creditable qualification and be embedded – even so many parents who have not been in the system are still confused by the complexity of the system.

I attended a meeting of Principals that was initiated by the Minster for Education on the 20th July. It was offered in response to the media campaign where many Principals asked for more time for the NCEA review. Themes that emerged from the discussion were around the reporting of soft skills, this aligns well with the changing face of work and the qualities that employers are looking for in staff, managing over assessment in a world where teenage anxiety is reported to be reaching new heights and the assessment system driving the curriculum rather than the other way around. Discussion also covered the need for Universities to be involved in the process as of much of what we do is driven by their imposed requirements.

We are a school with high student achievement, we also cater for those students who are less able, and in this debate we need to remember that we must cater to the needs of both groups. Our students are achieving above the national average for our decile and we want to continue to challenge them. As a staff we have responded to the invitation to voice our opinions and as parents I would encourage you to go on-line to have your voice heard.
